# **ESG PROGRAM**



We're a fully integrated pioneer in sustainable and responsible aquaculture. Sustainability has been our founding principle and core to our DNA for over 30 years, since we set up our first aquaculture site in Indonesia, farming in its pristine, deep-water lakes. Since then, we've come a long way but have remained passionately committed to farming in the most sustainable and responsible way possible across all operations.

Decades of experience make us true experts in the field and has allowed us to become who we are today: the #1 premium white fish aquaculture producer. Our goal? To provide a healthy, nutritious, and sustainable protein source for the growing population of our planet.

We're committed to integrating sustainable and responsible practices into our global supply chains and procurement processes. This includes ensuring that all activities — from sourcing raw feed materials to farming our fish from egg to harvest and monitoring processing, packaging, and transport — are as sustainable as possible and are safety, regulatory, environmentally, and socially compliant.

### WATER QUALITY MONITORING PROGRAM

#### **Partners:**

Wageningen University, Netherlands ASC, BAP, Ministry of Marine & Fisheries, etc. Period: January 2006-present

**Summary:** Regular water quality monitoring is vital to compliance with national legislation and third-party requirements. That's why we're measuring over 20 water quality parameters (e.g. water temp, DO, pH, turbidity, etc.) on a regular basis.

#### **Project description:**

The monitoring program was established as part of a collaboration between the company and the environmental sciences group from Wageningen University, Netherlands. Important contributions to the program were also made by Prof. Claude E. Boyd from Auburn University.

There are 22 parameters that we analyze in our internal laboratory. Depending on the parameter and requirement, samples are taken daily, weekly, monthly, or at other intervals. Our sampling locations are based on national legislation and environmental certifications.

- Aquaculture Stewardship Council (ASC): 9 sampling points/month.
- Best Aquaculture Practices: 8 sampling points/month.
- RKL-RPL (Government Regulation): 6 sampling locations/semester.
- The Good Fish Cultivation Program (CBIB) from the Marine and Fisheries Ministry (KKP): 6 samples/year.
- 6 samples from hatchery/month.
- Laboratories: Internal 312 samples/year; External 38 samples/year.









## **WATER AND LAKES**



### SEDIMENT MONITORING PROGRAM

**Partners:** 

Ministry of Environment

Period: 2008-present

**Summary:** Regular sediment samples are taken in key locations underneath the net pens on a bi-annual rota.

#### **Project description:**

It's important to monitor the sedimentation of organic material from aquaculture and other activities under net pens and in the surrounding lake system. Excessive organic accumulation can increase the oxygen consumption of the sediment, which can lead to anoxic benthos and decreasing ecological conditions. The release of dissolved nutrients can also stimulate plankton production. Based on this knowledge and the general idea of sustainable fish farming, Regal Springs Indonesia developed specific techniques to gain better insights about particle fluxes and the condition of the sediment in Lake Toba.

Parallel to the water quality monitoring program, regular sediment surveys are performed. Results lead to better insights about the effects of net-pen fish farming in Lake Toba and are helpful instruments for the sustainable use of the lake system for all stakeholders. We share our results with universities and third-party schemes to further develop the monitoring program and specific requirements.

### **SOLAR PANELS PROGRAM**

**Partners:**

Period: April 2021-present

**Summary:** We replaced diesel generators on the net-pen farms with 168 solar panels to provide the electricity we need (e.g. for lighting and CCTV).

#### **Project description:**

The goal of the project was to replace diesel generators that were typically used on the net-pen farms to provide electricity (e.g. for lighting or CCTV) with solar panels and battery storages. The project started in April 2021 and we continue to monitor its positive impacts.

The key benefits of the project are:

- Noise reduction.
- Lower health and safety risk.
- Eliminated risk of diesel spills.
- Reduced carbon emissions.
- Fewer system failures.

### **WATER HYACINTH MANAGEMENT**

#### **Partners:**

Environmental Services of Samosir Regency

Period: June 2023

#### **Summary:**

- 2 sets of water hyacinth chopping machines.
- 20 direct beneficiaries (local farmers).
- 300 indirect beneficiaries.

### **Project description:**

Water hyacinths are an invasive plant that can negatively impact the Lake Toba ecosystem if they're not managed. This can result in reduced dissolved oxygen and a disruption of the nitrification process.

The water hyacinth program aimed to support the Samosir Regency Government in reducing water hyacinth density in Lake Toba. Together with the Samosir Regency Environmental Service, Regal Springs Indonesia supported the local farmers and community to use the machines provided to produce compost, which can be used to fertilize agricultural land and also support food security in the direct surroundings.

### WATER QUALITY MONITORING PROGRAM

**Summary:** Regular water quality monitoring is vital to compliance with national legislation and third-party requirements. That's why we measured over 20 water quality parameters (e.g. water temp, DO, pH, turbidity, etc.) on a regular basis.

### **Project description:**

Water is essential for the well-being of fish. Therefore, we carried out extensive monitoring of our lake water to ensure pH, temperature, and oxygen levels are optimal for the life of the fish. In addition, wastewater treatment was carried out with the proper processes.

We utilized an internal laboratory to conduct our water analysis. There were established sampling points for all farming sites (Yojoa, Cajón, Hatchery) to monitor physical, chemical, and biological parameters in the water. Depending on the parameter and requirement, samples were taken daily, weekly, monthly, or at other intervals. We wanted to ensure the test values were always within the established legal limits and third-party requirements and were compliant with the operating standards that Regal Spring has established.

### **RESTOCKING PROGRAM**

#### **Partners:**

Fishermen's Association (ADPESCA and APAY) General Director of Fisheries and Agriculture (DIGEPESCA) **Start:** January **End:** April

**Summary:** Over 100,000 fish were stocked, which benefitted approximately 150 fishermen in

two municipalities.

### **Project description:**

In support of the fishermen of the ADPESCA Association of Lake El Cajón, and as part our community engagement, we stocked approximaterly 80,000 fish in the El Mango sector of the municipality of Victoria.

Additional to the support provided to the fishermen of the APAY Association of Lake Yojoa, the stocking of approximately 20,000 fish was also carried out in the Agua Azul mountain range, benefitting more than 60 fishermen in that sector.

### **CLEANING CAMPAIGNS**

#### **Partners:**

Buenos Aires Tourism Committee 14th Infantry Battalion National police APAY Fishermen's Association Community school **Start:** January **End:** December

**Summary:** As part of the program, over 11 tons of water hyacinths and over 200 garbage bags (8,000 pounds) full of rubbish were collected, benefitting over 35,000 people.

### **Project description:**

This project involved the removal of water hyacinths from Lake Yojoa in the community of Agua Azul Sierra, in coordination with the APAY Fishermen's Association, 14th Infantry Battalion, and volunteers from the company and community leaders. Over 11 tons of water hyacinths were removed and disposed of.

Garbage collection activities in the area of Lake Yojoa were organized in the tourist corridor of Los Naranjos towards the community of Peña Blanca and the municipality of Santa Cruz de Yojoa. Thanks to coordination with the Committee of Tourism, national police, schools, firefighters, armed forces, Aquafinca volunteers, and entrepreneurs, more than 200 bags of garbage were collected. Plus, we oversaw the construction of six solid waste collection stations in the municipality of Santa Cruz de Yojoa to help to reduce garbage on the streets.


**Start:** January 2023 **End:** December 2023

**Summary:** Regular water quality monitoring is vital to compliance with national legislation and third-party requirements. That's why we measured over 20 water quality parameters (e.g. water temp, DO, pH, turbidity, etc.) on a regular basis.

### **Project description:**

Water quality in aquaculture has a direct influence on fish reproduction and growth. Dissolved oxygen, temperature, pH, ammonia, and alkalinity are the most important parameters to monitor to ensure the quality needed.

Regal Springs Mexico has an established limnology program that includes monitoring at various sampling points — strategically established for each lake (Malpaso and Peñitas) as well as the hatchery. During this project, samples were analyzed at in-house laboratories. However, analyses were also carried out bi-monthly and semi-annually through an accredited external laboratory in order to ensure compliance with national legislations and the third-party requirements of our operations.

### SUPPORTING SMALL-SCALE FISH FARMERS

**Summary:** Training for the Members

of the Dique 1 and Herradura Cooperatives to implement best

aquaculture practices and biosecurity.

### **Project description:**

This project was focused on supporting small-scale fish farmers that operate in the same lakes as us by implementing best aquaculture practices and responsible methods. The aim was to foster responsible aquaculture development and improve the environmental sustainability and biosecurity protocols implemented by local small-scale farmers.

We created and communicated "production guidelines" for Chiapas, including biosecurity best practices for the main producers of the lakes in order to raise awareness of responsible practices and biosecurity issues — using federal legislation as a basis. The goal was for these fish farmers to become the example of best practices for their communities.

Furthermore, we supported the delivery of routine fish health diagnosis and epidemiological surveillance plans. We also encouraged responsible waste management in the collection centers of the local fishing cooperatives — located in the area of influence of RSM — and supported biological load capacity studies.

### **COMMUNITY CLEANING PROGRAM (AMACOHITE)**

#### **Partners:**

Protección Civil Municipal (CONANP) Two communities from the municipality of Ostuacán, Chiapas Start: January 2023 End: October 2023

**Summary:** Collection of rubbish in the community of Bajo Amacohite and Plan de Avala.

#### **Project description:**

We provided these communities with essential materials such as bin bags and general cleaning supplies and organized regular community cleaning events, during which volunteers collected rubbish to improve the environment and reduce the breeding habitat for mosquitos.

We organized special campaigns, such as the "Prevention of dengue, Zika and Chikungunya" campaign. This event raised awareness and allowed the community to reduce their risk of getting infected with one these diseases that are transmitted by mosquito bites or as an indirect consequence of rubbish.

### WATER HYACINTH MANAGEMENT

#### **Partners:**

University of Sciences and Arts of Chiapas Cooperatives

**Start:** January 2023 **End:** December 2023

**Summary:** Training of the cooperatives and communities in Ostuacan in removal and use of

water hyacinths.

### **Project description:**

The project focused on the sustainable use of the water hyacinths in the dam and aimed to take advantage of this invasive plant species to generate revenue with the fishing cooperatives and communities of Ostuacán, Chiapas.

Due to its socio-environmental characteristics, the program interacted with MSN in collaboration with the scientific community of Chiapas, the University of Chiapas, and the community of Ostuacán itself.

This program explored various case studies on how water hyacinths could be best used. The three most promising pathways were composting, the use for animal feed (ruminants), and use in producing building blocks.

### HONDURAS FOREST PROTECTION STRATEGY

#### **Summary:**

- 16,000 trees planted
- 9,470 hectares of forest protected
- 43 participating communities
- 4 participating municipalities

### **Project description:**

The forest protection and conservation strategy is based on incentives known as "environmental barter," which, in a strategic, coordinated, dynamic, and participatory sense, involves all the actors and sectors linked to the territory called ZFPEC.

Our strategy was implemented by organized communities protecting the forests and carrying out reforestation campaigns for incentives from the company. They joined efforts to mitigate the scourge of forest fires and contribute to water conservation and care, with emphasis on the integrated management of natural resources in the areas of influence of hydroelectric plants. The protection plan protects areas based on vulnerability categories (very high, high, medium, and low) and by forming combat brigades with personnel from organized communities.











## REFORESTATION



### RESTORATION IN OCOTE BIOSPHERE RESERVE

**Partners:** CONANP EIZIA A.C. **Start:** January 2023 **End:** December 2023

**Summary:** Reforestation of 15 hectares, to the benefit of three communities and the environment.

### **Project description**

Regal Springs Mexico, CONANP, and EIZIA A.C., collaborated in strengthening local participation in actions for better environmental, aquacultural, and social practices in the Ocote Biosphere Reserve. Given such relevance, private initiatives, civil society organizations, the government, and local communities have played important roles in the conservation and preservation of this protected natural area.

Through this program, we achieved the reforestation of 15 hectares with 12,000 native trees in strategic sites in the Median Forest of the Ocote Jungle Biosphere Reserve in 2023.

This program intends to contribute to the regeneration of the ecological connectivity, mitigate the effects of climate change, and assist ecological restoration processes and environmental services.

### **BEST-IN-CLASS AWARD**

#### **Partners:**

Elementary school around Toba farming and processing plant area

**Period :** August & September 2023

**Summary:** 237 students in 12 different schools across six regencies were awarded with school equipment packages.

### **Project description:**

Regal Springs Indonesia encourages an interest in learning at the elementary school level by providing stimulus prizes for best-in-class winners.

These school equipment packages are provided annually at the beginning of each new school year. The packages include bags, school equipment, and certificates.

The program doesn't only support the students directly, but also has an impact on the company's good relations with students' parents, as well as teachers who are part of an empowered community.

### BASIC NEEDS ASSISTANCE FOR HONORARIUM TEACHERS

#### **Partners:**

Local elementary school

Period: May and November 2023

**Summary:** 35 honorarium teachers are supported twice a year with a basic needs package (70 basic needs packages per year in total).

### **Project description:**

This basic needs assistance program for honorary teachers is carried out with the aim of further supporting and motivating honorary teachers who only receive a basic teaching salary.

We believe that our support and assistance can allow teachers to focus better on the education of the children.

### LOCAL MSMES EMPOWERMENT

**Partners:** 

Local MSMEs

**Period:** September and December 2023

#### **Summary:**

- 2 MSMEs
- 27 beneficiaries
- 30-unit MSME tents

#### **Project description:**

Regal Springs Indonesia supports the development of culinary Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) in areas around the company's operations by providing raw materials, cooking equipment, and assistance for marketing. One such initiative currently underway involves the production of value-added products made from tilapia fish, such as meatballs, tilapia floss, and tilapia fish crackers. These products are produced by:

- Muara Tanjung Women's Group in Sei Nagalawan Village, Perbaungan District, Serdang Bedagai Regency, North Sumatra.
- Makmur Jaya in Toba area.

Regal Springs Indonesia continues its efforts to introduce delicious and highly nutritious convenience foods made from tilapia fish.

### "READERS TO LEADERS" PROGRAM (HONDURAS)

#### **Partners:**

**USAID** 

Ministry of Education

**Start:** January **End:** April

**Summary:** This program provided 4,000 books to 4,000 students at 46 schools in six municipalities.

#### **Project description:**

This program was led by the government, USAID, and our company to improve students' pedagogical knowledge in reading and writing. It sought to complement the activities that teachers currently carry out with new teaching practices, thus improving the learning rates in reading and writing of boys and girls from first to sixth grade.

In support of the pillar of education, we delivered more than 4,000 Spanish books to more than 46 schools in the communities of the municipalities of San Francisco de Yojoa, Santa Cruz de Yojoa, Minas de Oro Comayagua, Taulable Comayagua, La Libertad Comayagua, and Victoria Yoro — benefitting more than 4,000 students.

### **EDUCATODOS PROGRAM**

#### **Partners:**

Ministry of Education Community boards **Start:** January **End:** December

**Summary:** This program supported four teachers and 215 students in four schools across four municipalities.

### **Project description:**

This alternative education program had a flexible and agile modality to achieve the educational incorporation of children and young people between 10 and 35 years old who haven't started or completed basic education, especially in rural and peri-urban areas.

Through the program, we directly contributed to the eradication of illiteracy and the improvement of education across the target population through a quality educational offer.

A bonus was given to teachers so they could teach classes in educational centers in the municipalities of Victoria in Yoro, San Francisco de Yojoa, Minas de Oro, and La Libertad, Comayagua.

### **ACCESS TO EDUCATION**

#### **Partners:**

Ministry of Education Community boards **Start:** February **End:** November

**Summary:** This program supported three teachers and 92 students in two schools across two municipalities.

### **Project description:**

Funding cuts and an increased number of enrolled students have threatened access to education for many young people.

Since 2010, this project has supported three teachers in the communities of Borbotón and Agua Azul Sierra with a financial bonus, in agreement with the education boards and districts — allowing education to reach the communities adjacent to our production centers in Lake Yojoa and Borbotón.

### STRENGTHENING EDUCATIONAL CENTERS

#### **Partners:**

CEPUDO association Municipalities of Lajas **Start:** February

End: June

**Summary:** This program

supported three teachers and 200

students in three educational centers across two municipalities.

### **Project description:**

This project focused on investments into educational centers, which improved the learning and teaching conditions for students and educators.

The investment that we provided to the educational centers was used for improvements such as the remodelling of the classrooms in the municipality of Lajas, Comayagua. It was also used to purchase furniture, paints, and materials that were used to improve the schools and kindergartens of Borbotón, San Francisco de Yojoa, and Minas de Oro, Comayagua.

### **EDUCATION FOR ADULT EMPLOYEES**

#### **Partners:**

Chiapas Institute of Education for Youth and Adults (ICHEJA)

**Start:** January 2023 **End:** December 2023

**Summary:** This program supported 65 employees in completing an elementary school education.

### **Project description:**

The aim of this program was to help employees and adult members of neighboring communities improve their literacy to an elementary school level.

ICHEJA provided the books and the teacher (two hours per week) and conducted the exams.

Regal Springs organized a closing ceremony and provides all basic materials and a special t-shirt.

### **NUTRITIONAL INTAKE SUPPLEMENTARY FOOD PACKAGE**

#### **Partners:**

Local integrated health care Kindergarten Local authorities **Period :** January-December 2023

**Summary:** This program supported 1,631 beneficiaries with 11,380 food packages for eight kindergartens and 15 integrated healthcare centers.

#### **Project description:**

To support the local governments in providing balanced nutrition through the health program, we provided more than 1,000 supplementary food packages per month for mothers, babies, toddlers, and young children in order to prevent malnutrition.

The program, which is in line with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal No. 3 ("Good Health and Welfare"), also involved partnerships with integrated health centers (Posyandu), kindergartens, and early childhood education centers in villages surrounding the operational/farming area in the Toba and Samosir regencies and a processing plant in Serdang Bedagai Regency, North Sumatra.

In the Toba and Samosir regencies, green bean porridges and boiled duck eggs were provided to 1,000 pregnant women and toddlers. Meanwhile, in Serdang Bedagai Regency, green bean porridges, vegetables, eggs, and vitamins were provided to nearly 800 toddlers and pregnant women.

### **BLOOD DONATION AND FREE MASS CIRCUMCISION**

#### **Partners:**

Local public hospital Third-party sponsor

Period: December 22, 2023

**Summary:** Together with the local public hospital, 130 blood donations were collected and more than 130 boys received free surgery.

### **Project description:**

To strengthen its commitment to employee and community welfare in terms of health, Regal Springs Indonesia organized a blood donation and free circumcision event in the processing plant area of Serdang Regency Bedagai.

This activity was in collaboration with the local hospital Amri Tambunan for blood donations and the Islamic Faith Agency (BKI) PT Aqua Farm Nusantara for circumcisions, with a total target beneficiary of more than 260 people.

Circumcisions and blood donations are carried out almost every year by Regal Springs Indoensia, but this was halted when the COVID-19 pandemic prevented it.

### **PUBLIC HEALTH CENTER FACILITIES IMPROVEMENT**

#### **Partners:**

Local public health center G4S (security vendor)

Period: September 2023

**Summary:** Regal Springs donated 10 sets of sinks and the required amount of PVC pipe for water installation. This improvement benefits approximately 600 people from the local communities.

### **Project description:**

Regal Springs Indonesia donated several additional sinks and supporting facilities to improve the local public health center's services, hygiene, and patient comfort. This activity was also supported by G4S (our security partner).

# STUNTING PREVENTION AND NUTRITION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

#### **Partners:**

National Population and Family Planning board of Serdang Bedagai Regency Period: June-October 2023

**Summary:** We provided over 720 kg of tilapia trimming meat, which benefitted over 2,500 people in the local communities.

### **Project description:**

Together with the National Population and Family Planning (BKKBN) for Serdang Bedagai Regency, Regal Springs Indonesia provided tilapia trimming meat to be processed into nutritious food.

This food will be given to 500 children every month to improve nutrition and prevent stunting.

### STRENGTHENING HEALTH CENTERS

**Start:** January **End:** November

**Summary:** We supported local health centers in improving their facilities and supplied over 2,000 packages of medicine. This investment benefitted over 28,000

people in four municipalities.

### **Project description:**

The remodelling of the community health center of Rio Lindo was achieved in conjunction with the Municipality of San Francisco de Yojoa, Aquafeed, and the Ministry of Health. This project focused on the waiting room, admission and archive, pre-clinic, clinical laboratory waiting room, reception, and sampling area.

We also invested in construction material for the restoration of the Rigoberto Madrid health center in the community of San Francisco de Yojoa. The dentistry and general consultation areas were significantly improved.

This health center is a fundamental pillar for the inhabitants of various communities in the municipality, providing them with quality medical care. More than 2,000 packages of medicine were delivered to the health centers in the communities of Rio Lindo in San Francisco de Yojoa, Minas de Oro in Comayagua, Victoria in Yoro, and Santa Cruz de Yojoa, benefitting more than 2,500 people.

**Summary:** By supporting medical brigades, more than 900 people benefited in three municipalities.

#### **Project description:**

In coordination with the Ministry of Sal y Luz and the Child Life Center, important medical brigades were carried out in the community of Agua Azul Sierra (Santa Cruz de Yojoa), Nueva Murcia (San Francisco de Yojoa), and La Libertad (Comayagua), where more than 900 people received general medical, dental, and ophthalmological care.

The medical brigades reached the most distant communities in our municipalities, where people don't have access to a health center.

**Summary:** We provided more than 12,000 portions of fish to three shelter houses and the 14th Infantry Battalion. Furthermore, fertilizer was given to farmers to boost their harvest.

### **Project description:**

With our food security program, we supported three shelter houses and the 14th Infantry Battalion, providing more than 10,500 portions of fish per year.

In agreement with the CEPUDO Association/Peña Blanca Chapter, food was delivered for the grandparents program in the communities of Buena Vista and La Aguita in the municipality of Santa Cruz de Yojoa.

We also provided food for the fishermen of the ADPESCA Fishermen's Association in Lake Cajón and the APAY association in Lake Yojoa.

Furthermore, urea fertilizers were given to 100 families belonging to the municipality of Victoria, Yoro, to boost their harvests.

#### **Project description:**

Regal Springs Indonesia supported local authorities to maintain and repair approximately 9 km of roads. Improving road infrastructure enables local communities to benefit from better access to transportation and a more efficient and safe distribution of economic goods.

Furthermore, a heavily damaged key section of a road that had deep potholes and was regularly flooded with water was repaired. The 190-meter-long, four-meter-wide road section is located in Naga Kisar Village, Serdang Bedagai Regency, North Sumatra, which also became tourist access to Cermin Beach.

**Summary:** Together with local municipalities, we repaired 42 km of roads and 400 m of pavements, which will support six communities across two municipalities. This will benefit approximately 40,000 people.

#### **Project description:**

In agreement with the municipality of Santa Cruz de Yojoa and residents of the community, the paving of one of the main streets of the Agua Azul Sierra community was repaired. This road leads to the Regal Springs farming center on Lake Yojoa. Moreover, 200 m of road were paved together with the Zapote community in the same municipality.

In agreement with with the municipality of San Francisco de Yojoa, the maintenance of 8 km of the road that leads from the CA5 to Rio Lindo was carried out, benefitting more than 25,000 people who transit through this sector. The maintenance of the alternate street that leads from the community of Los Planes to the Ocotal was also carried out as part of the fire prevention activities in the El Cajon sector. Furthermore, the road that leads from the Cajón reservoir to the community of Cabeceras in the municipality of Santa Cruz de Yojoa was maintained.

The blockade was due to a landslide of a hillside on the side of the road. The landslide was a result of the intense rainfalls caused by the Cold Front No. 9. This blockade prevented transports and commuting between the communities by land.
